Half million in funding from Library Friends

CHILDREN'S LITERACY was a big winner in 2002, when the Friends of Toronto Public Library North Chapter presented the library with a \$45,000 cheque. Primarily the result of sales in Book Ends – the Friends bookstore for donated and withdrawn library materials – the

money will go to the Leading to Reading program for children in Grades 2-6 who are having trouble reading at their grade level.

The South Chapter of the Library Friends raised \$37,000 in 2002. Services benefiting from the South Chapter donation include Toronto Reference Library writing programs, English Can Be Fun for newcomers to Canada, and Mobile Library Services, which provides library materials and services to people who

can't get to any of TPL's 98 branches.

Total contributions to library programs, services and collections by the Friends of Toronto Public Library will reach a half million dollars sometime in 2003.

Library Board Highlights

December 9, 2002

French Language Services and Collections Plan

Staff presented the French Language Services and Collection Plan to the Board. The purpose of the plan is to improve city-wide access to French language collections and services through:

- the creation of 10 large French language collections strategically located across Toronto
- a number of small collections of French children's materials up to Grade 8 located near appropriate schools
- promotion of our services and collections
- modification of collection to more closely match user needs
- the creation of new partnerships with French language community groups, agencies and schools.

2003 Operating and Capital Budgets – Status

The Board was briefed on the Operating and Capital Budget presentation to the Budget Advisory Committee. The committee requested the following information:

- a five-year plan at \$10 million per year for the Capital Budget
- a report on traffic patterns in Toronto Public Library branches
- information on how the ALA/CLA conference will be funded and how other city departments can assist
- comparison of the Library with other city departments regarding gapping figures.

Operating Budget Monitoring Report – October 31, 2002

This report was received by the Board for information. The Toronto Public Library has a favourable balance and spending will be within the budget as approved by Council.

Migrate/Rebuild Web-Based Services – Award of Proposal

The Toronto Public Library Board moved to grant authority to enter into an agreement with Devlin Applied Design for the migration and rebuild of Web-based services. This company was awarded the contract following a rigorous tendering process.
