Shchuka reconstruction a go

Construction of the new Maria A. Shchuka branch of Toronto Public Library kicked off with groundbreaking ceremonies on April 23. The year-long branch closure and reconstruction will produce a facility with updated equipment, an electronic learning centre, program and meeting room space and more.

According to Councillor Howard Moscoe, in whose ward the new library is situated, the project marks the beginning of the revitalization of the stretch of Eglinton Avenue west of the Allen Expressway.

Councillor Joe Mihevc, who has supported the project since its inception, says, "The new Maria Shchuka Branch will be of great benefit to the community. But it is also a project dear to my heart. I grew up four blocks from this library. Like many immigrant families, the Mihevcs didn't have money to buy books. I grew up reading and learning at Maria Shchuka."

Library partnerships help meet community needs

Two Toronto Public Library partnerships are helping connect Torontonians to important community resources. *English Conversation Circle* (ECC) helps newcomers to Canada get settled. *Community Talks* bring doctors and other experts together with people looking for reliable health information.

"One of the most difficult things about settling in a new country is meeting people and making contacts," says multicultural service specialist Chryss Mylopoulos. "Toronto Public Library has partnered with CultureLink, a Toronto-based non-profit organization, to help."

With the assistance of experienced facilitators, ECC participants make new friends and develop conversational skills during their weekly, two-hour informal discussions.

Participants also learn how to obtain a library card, how to use the library catalogue and how to find and use important library resources such as the website, User Education programs and materials in 100 different languages.

ECC is offered at Agincourt and Cedarbrae branches. At Agincourt, in addition to CultureLink, program partners include the Family Wellness Centre of Scarborough Hospital and Catholic Cross-Cultural Services.

We're meeting a real need

Community Talks, another program provided in cooperation with The Scarborough Hospital, is a series of free lectures for Torontonians about health and wellness issues, such as teen parenting, coping with asthma, and Parkinson's disease.

"More than 1,100 people showed up to hear Barbara Colorosa talk about teen parenting," explains library manager Mary Budd. "The topics of *Community Talks* are chosen according to community demand. Response to the *Talks* has been overwhelming, a testament to the fact that we're meeting a real need."

Library walk named for mystery man

The lane behind the Toronto Reference Library, connecting Asquith Avenue and Church Street, was officially named "Sherlock Holmes Walk" after the famous fictional detective, and in honour of the library's Arthur Conan Doyle Collection. The Arthur Conan Doyle Room

in the Toronto Reference Library is a re-creation of Holmes' study at 221B Baker Street, and holds one of the largest collections of Sherlockiana in North America, drawing visitors and enthusiasts from around the world. The room is open from 2-4 p.m., Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, or by appointment, but its contents can be used any time the library is open.

Library repeats popular high school outreach

Librarians from Toronto Public Library will visit Toronto District and Catholic secondary schools this spring to show students, teachers and school librarians how to use the library's one-stop Internet subject site, the Virtual Reference Library (VRL). Back by popular demand, this program helps students with their studies by introducing them to the VRL and to the library's electronic magazine, newspaper and other databases. In 2001, library staff met with more than 10,000 students and educators, resulting in a 40 percent increase in teen library card registration. Funding in 2002 came from interest generated by the Gates Grant.

Library Board Highlights

May 13, 2002

Operating Budget Monitoring Report – March 31, 2002

This report, which gives a summary of the gross and net expenditures for a three-month period ending March 31, 2002, was received by the Board for information.

2002 Bookmobile Schedule

The Board received a report on the 2002 Bookmobile Schedule for information. The bookmobile schedule was changed significantly in 2001 to harmonize the service across the City. In 2002, there will be no changes to the schedule.

2002/2003 Fundraising Priorities

The Board adopted a list of 2002/2003 Fundraising Priorities including the Leading to Reading and English Can Be Fun programs, the Summer Reading Club, and the Pre-School Initiatives program, which is designed to help improve reading skills for children in high-needs communities.

Other projects include School Outreach programs, which will encourage the use of library resources among Kindergarten, grade four and high school students, the Bookmark Design Contest and the Toronto Reference Library Information Commons.

Renaming the Canada Trust Exhibitions Gallery and the Canada Trust Audubon Collection

The Board approved the renaming of this gallery and collection to reflect the new name of the former CT Financial Services Inc. (Canada Trust) to the TD Financial Group (TD Bank). The new names will be the TD Gallery and the TD Audubon Collection.

Internet Service at Toronto Public Library

A report was provided to the Board on the Toronto Public Library's Internet Service in response to a motion at Toronto City Council's meeting on April 16, 17 & 18, 2002. The following recommendations were adopted:

- That the Board request that library staff review current policies and practices to determine if further improvements can be made
- That the Board request that library staff report to the Board at a later date on the outcome of the review.

Toronto Public Library – Review of Year-End Spending, Fleet Maintenance, Use of Consultants and Budgets for Maintenance and Repairs

The Board passed a motion to receive the City Auditor's report Toronto Public Library – Review of Year-End Spending, Fleet Maintenance, Use of Consultants and Budgets for Maintenance and Repairs and to adopt recommendations included in this report.

Malvern Branch – Closure for Construction

The Board approved the closure of Malvern Branch early in 2003 for approximately one year to allow for the construction and renovation of the branch.

Maria A. Shchuka Branch Site

The Board approved the ratification of earlier surplus land declaration and other matters to facilitate construction of affordable housing on the south side of the Maria A. Shchuka site.
