

Ralph Nader, Nino Ricci, Margaret Atwood, Gloria Steinem among featured speakers in Toronto, June 19-25

NINO RICCI WILL BE ONE OF MANY AUTHORS in attendance when the American Library Association (ALA) and the Canadian Library Association (CLA) convene together in Canada for the world's largest and most comprehensive library conference and exhibition. Thousands of librarians, educators, writers, publishers and special guests will attend more than 2,000 meetings, discussion groups and programs on topics affecting libraries, June 19-25 in Toronto.

Featured speakers include Congressman Bernie Sanders (I-Vermont), sponsor of the *Freedom to Read Protection Act*; Ralph Nader, consumer advocate and founder of the D.C. Library Renaissance Project; Naomi Klein, activist and author of *No Logo*; Karen Nussbaum, founder of 9-5 Women's Labor Movement; and architect Gunnar Birkerts, who designed the National Library of Latvia and the combined San Jose Public Library/San Jose State University Library.

Award-winning author and broadcaster Rex Murphy and Belzberg Professor of Conflict Management at the University of Toronto Janice Gross Stein will keynote Wendy Newman's CLA President's Program on Sunday morning.


Acclaimed author Margaret Atwood and her seminal book *The Handmaid's Tale* will take centerstage as part of the first-ever One Book, One Conference program. As an added bonus, Random House has donated more than 100 of Atwood's newest book *Oryx and Crake* to be raffled to conference participants.

Malvern gets major reconstruction

MALVERN BRANCH of the Toronto Public Library closed June 8 for a one-year major renovation and expansion. Patrons of this northeast Scarborough library will enjoy an additional 10,000 square feet of space when it reopens in the summer of 2004.

"This busy library serves a community whose population has quadrupled since it opened in the early 1980s," says City Librarian Josephine Bryant. "This is an exciting project that gives us the opportunity to meet the needs of this growing community."

When Malvern reopens, it will be visible from the street and offer its patrons a computer training room, expanded meeting rooms, spaces for quiet study and adult and children's literacy programs.

The Malvern renovation project will be executed by Phillip H. Carter — Architect in joint venture with Kingsland + Architects Inc. Carter designed the Barbara Frum Branch and the award-winning Lillian H. Smith Branch. He has renovated numerous other branches including Centennial, Wychwood, Main Street and Fairview.

Hours of the nearby Burrows Hall Branch have been extended to provide library service to the surrounding community. As well, a bookmobile, parked near the construction site beside the main entrance to the Community Centre, serves the Malvern community:

Tuesday and Thursday, 3–5 p.m. and 6–8 p.m.
Saturday, 9:30 a.m.–12 noon and 1–4:30 p.m.

During the closure, library customers can return library materials to any Toronto Public Library Branch. Malvern holds on library materials can be picked up at the Burrows Hall Branch, 1081 Progress Avenue, 416-396-8740.

Other branches in the area are Highland Creek Branch, 3550 Ellesmere Road and Woodside Square Branch, Woodside Square Mall, 1571 Sandhurst Circle.

TPL wins Web award

Toronto Public Library has won a 2003 Best of the Web Award for the *SmallbizXpress* Gateway, featured on the library website



www.tpl.toronto.on.ca (click on Virtual Reference Library). The gateway, which features information for small businesses and entrepreneurs, was chosen for the award by librarians, educators, subject-area specialists and editors. Criterion for selection included usability, accessibility, design clarity, range of resources, ranges of services and community impact.

GATS and the impact on public service

THE GENERAL AGREEMENT on Trade in Services (GATS) negotiations now underway—"hot and heavy"—in Geneva, are more transparent and more inclusive than earlier rounds.

"And that's a good thing," said Ken Traynor, moderator of the panel discussion, WTO and GATS: The Challenge to Public Service, held at TRL, on May 22. "Because good public policy only develops when people who use public services and people who deliver public services are involved."

Paul Whitney, Director of the Vancouver Public Library and Canadian Library Association rep at the discussion, couldn't agree more, but he noted, "there is a real lack of awareness of what libraries in fact do. There is no case law regarding this. Many things are undefined, ambiguous and contentious." Libraries need to stay involved, he said, to see "how the pressure will play out over many rounds."

GATS is an international agreement, in effect since 1995, and administered by the World Trade Organization (WTO), that attempts to remove barriers to trade in commercial services. Canada is an original signatory. Negotiations to develop the agreement are ongoing.

More than 70 people attended the public discussion led by Traynor, a researcher with the Canadian Environmental Law Association. Panel members included: Steven Shrybman, Law Partner, Sack, Goldblatt and Mitchell; Paul Whitney; John Burrett, Manager, Economic and Social Policy Federation of Canadian Municipalities; and James Perttula, Senior Policy Advisor/Team Leader, Trade and International Policy Branch, Ministry of Enterprise, Opportunity and Innovation.



Board Highlights

June 9, 2003

Financial Control Policy

The board adopted this policy to provide the Toronto Public Library Board with delegation of authority to senior Library staff to conduct the financial affairs of the Library in a controlled, effective and efficient manner. This includes budget approval, procurement of goods and services, award of contracts, authorization for commitments, approval for payments, write-off of bad debts and control over further delegation authorities. The new policy combines and replaces the Interim Financial Control Policy and Purchasing Policy.

Strategic Plan 2004 – 2006: Proposed Consultation Plan

The Toronto Public Library is beginning the development of new three-year strategic plan. Consultations are planned

at the city-wide, regional and local levels starting this fall. The Toronto Public Library wants public and staff input in order to continue delivering the best possible services.

Toronto Public Library Foundation — 2002 in Review, 2003 Priorities

Rick Goldsmith, the Library Foundation Chair, provided a status report on the Toronto Public Library Foundation's progress and targets. The report identified a target of \$1.5 million annual campaign for 2003 to support library programs — including children's reading and literacy programs.

Operating Budget Monitoring Report — April 30, 2003

This report, which gives a summary of the gross and net expenditures for the four month period ending April 30, 2003, was received by the Board for information.

Lease Renewals and Reconstruction

Lease renewals were approved for Bridlewood and Guildwood branches. Morningside Branch was approved for relocation and lease renewal. McGregor Park Branch was approved for reconstruction and Runnymede Branch was approved for closure for reconstruction.
