Kabuki!

KABUKI IS A TWO-PART exhibition of 18th and 19th century woodblock prints from the Toronto Public Library's Performing Arts Collection that will be on display in the TD Gallery at Toronto Reference Library (789 Yonge, north of Bloor) from May to September. The exhibits feature wood block prints of Kabuki actors and performances by such notable artists as Kunisada, Kunichika, Toyokuni I, Hirosada and Kuniyoshi.

A traditional form of Japanese theatre, Kabuki originated early in the 17th century when a shrine maiden named Okuni brought her unique and lively dance style to the dry river beds of the ancient capital of Kyoto. Over the next 300 years, Kabuki developed into a sophisticated, highly stylized form of theatre. Though Kabuki was created by a woman, since early on all roles have been performed by men.

The fourth annual Toronto Public Library Celebrates Reading Award went to Toronto Poet Laureate Dennis Lee.

"Dennis Lee's remarkable writing has contributed enormously to Toronto's literary scene," says City Librarian Josephine Bryant. "In addition to becoming Toronto's first Poet Laureate, he has spellbound millions of readers, children and adults alike, with his poems and stories."

The Toronto Public Library Celebrates Reading Award honours individuals, organizations or corporations who have made an outstanding contribution to the enjoyment of reading. Previous winners include *Franklin* creators Paulette Bourgeois and Brenda Clark, children's author Ken Oppel, and TV Ontario.




Toronto Public Library Celebrates Reading Award winner Dennis Lee

Named Toronto's first Poet Laureate in 2001, Dennis Lee is the critically acclaimed author of numerous award-winning books of poetry for adults and children. Co-founder of the House of Anansi and former poetry editor for McClelland and Stewart, Lee received the Governor General's Award for poetry in 1972 and the Vicky Metcalf Award for a body of work for children in 1986. Some of his well-loved titles include *Alligator Pie*, *Jelly Belly*, *Garbage Delight* and *Bubblegum Delicious*.


"There are few things a parent can do that will help their child more in learning to read than ensuring he or she makes regular visits to the library," says Library Child and Youth Advocate Ken Setterington.

Lifelong literacy, starting from the earliest years, is a powerful asset for success in school, work and life, according to Setterington. "We want every young family in Toronto to bring their children into their local library branch, get a library card and visit regularly to enjoy all the programs and services the library has to offer."

More than 2,000 kindergarten children have registered this year as a result of the campaign, says Setterington. The effort got underway in September 2003 and has been supported by a generous donation from TD Bank Financial Group.

Cory Doctorow at Merril



Board support for burned Montreal library
In response to the recent anti-Semitic attacks in Toronto and Montreal, the Toronto Public Library Board voted unanimously to support the United Talmud Torah school library with the donation of \$1,000 for the purchase of a new *World Book*, or other collection items of their choice. Starting Sunday, September 12, 2004, the McGregor Park Branch of Toronto Public Library will open from 1:30-5 p.m. Sundays during the school year.
