MORE THAN 100 authors, illustrators, storytellers and notable Torontonians are headlining a range of interesting programs, as part of Keep Toronto Reading month in February. Keep Toronto Reading is a celebration of the joy and importance of reading as well as our city's thriving literary culture.

Presented by the Toronto Public Library and the Library Foundation, the month-long, free event-fest will include: Thursday lunchtime readings; family storytellings; Canada Reads and

Mayor Miller will declare February as Keep Toronto Reading month at a press launch on Friday, January 27. City total exceeds \$1 million

The Library's campaign was also publicly recognized with the City of Toronto Director's Award for the best campaign among City departments and agencies with over 1,000 employees. All told, the City of Toronto raised \$1.15 million to fund UW social programs and services.

Kiwanis Outreach Storytime

During its second full year of operation, the Kiwanis Outreach Storytime touched the lives of more than 1,500 children and their parents

ONE LITTLE boy, who initially didn't want to join the circle of children listening to stories and singing, was finally persuaded to sit beside program volunteer George Davis. Seeing that the little boy had pulled a book off the display behind him, Davis looked at pictures with the boy, read to him and asked some questions.

After that, the little boy stayed with George, listening to stories and singing along with the songs. According to one of the program coordinators, "This little boy found a friend in a big man who read to him."

The Outreach Storytime program, sponsored by Kiwanis Clubs of West Toronto, sees Toronto Public Library staff and Kiwanis volunteers visit community service facilities

to promote libraries and reading among young children and their parents. In 2005, staff conducted 54 community storytime sessions at seven locations.

In addition to telling stories, singing songs and performing

action rhymes with the kids, library staff distribute library cards and loan out library books.

Over 90 percent of the parents and more than 80 percent of the kids said they liked the program a lot. One seven-year-old boy cried at the end of a session, telling program staff he could come to only one session, but he wanted to come back every week.

When asked how the program could be improved, the answers generally focus on offering more sessions or making the program longer.

Gillian Mason – promoting the “hidden” library

Toronto Public Library Board Chair an exceptional leader helping advance this extraordinary resource

OUTGOING TORONTO Public Library Board Chair Gillian Mason joined the Board in 1998 and has been chair since 2001. She will continue as a member of the Board for the upcoming year.

“Serving on and ultimately chairing the Toronto Public Library Board has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life,” says Mason. “I marvel at the richness of what the library provides and at the esteem with which Torontonians view this extraordinary resource in their midst. I have also come to understand that

library staff are among the most committed, intelligent, creative public servants I have ever come across. Public servants in the finest sense of the word – people who dedicate themselves in their daily work lives to providing the best possible access to good information

for the people of Toronto.”

Since joining the Board, Mason has made great advances in ensuring that city leaders are aware of the often hidden role of the library as a catalyst in building a strong, dynamic city through social and economic contributions to community. Under Mason’s leadership, the library won the Canadian Urban Institute’s Leadership Award for City Living.

Says Mason: “I’m proud to have been a part of a library board that managed to protect their budget over the first years of the new

millennium; and I’m proud to have helped allocate that budget to enhance library services and to provide beautiful branches that speak to, and are embraced by, their communities.”

The capital budget program that was developed while Mason was Chair established the footprint for branch development that has resulted in: the opening of the new and much-needed St. James Town Branch; the rebuilding of McGregor Park, Maria A. Shchuka, Eatonville and Leaside branches; the relocation and recreation of Black Creek and Bayview branches; and significant renovations to Runnymede, Malvern, Long Branch

and Beaches branches.

While Mason was Chair, she helped oversee the completion of one strategic plan and the development of a new one, *Urban Stories: The Next Chapter*, that emphasized:

- Books and Culture
- Low-Income Neighbourhoods
- Newcomers
- Youth

“As Chair,” explains Mason, “I felt my most important role was to give as much exposure as I could to this extraordinarily successful and fundamentally important organisation that lies at the heart of every community in the city.”

“Toronto Public Library is the most successful public library in the world,” concludes Mason, “thanks in large part to the support and patronage of the good people of Toronto.”

An urban planner who has completed graduate work in public administration, Mason recently became the Executive Director and CEO of the Commonwealth Association for Public Administration and Management (CAPAM), an international association dedicated to professional exchange among senior public sector officials in the 53 countries of the Commonwealth.

South Friends donations hit \$200,000

WITH A December donation of \$44,000, the Friends of Toronto Public Library, South Chapter have given the Library over \$200,000 since their inception in 1997. South Friends funds have helped to purchase a Home Library Service Van, bolster HLS collections, enhance literacy and literary programs at the Toronto Reference Library and, for the last few years, to fully fund the English Can Be Fun summer program for newcomer children aged 7-10.

Friends donate over \$100,000 in 2005

In addition to the \$44,000 South Chapter donation, the Library benefited from a \$60,000 donation by the North Chapter of the Friends in 2005, bringing the total donated by Friends last year to more than \$100,000. The North Chapter donation goes to Leading to Reading, a children’s literacy program.

Library Board Highlights January 2006

New Board Chair and Vice-Chair elected

William Booth is the new Chair of the Toronto Public Library Board. Booth has been a Board member since 2001, acting as Vice-Chair since 2003. A dedicated library patron since he was six, Booth has been in the book business since 1981, as a bookseller, editor and sales and publishing manager.

New Board Vice-Chair Kathy Gallagher Ross is a long-time library member, avid reader and supporter of the Toronto Public Library. A mother of three, she hopes to put her experience as an early childhood educator, nurse and early intervention and prevention specialist toward supporting the Library as a key ingredient of a healthy community. She is the author of *A Parent's Guide to Choosing Day Care: Finding the Best Alternative for your Child* and co-author/

editor of *Good Day Care: Fighting for It, Getting It, Keeping It*. Kathy is the new Director of Public Policy for the United Way (GTA) starting in February 2006.

Outgoing Chair, Gillian Mason will continue on as a member of the Board for the upcoming year. (see article, page 3)

2006 Capital Budget

The Board adopted the 2006-2010, Toronto City Council-approved, Capital Budget of \$10.509 million debt.

TD/TPL partnership renewed

TD Bank Financial Group's \$1.22 million commitment, over the next three years, to Toronto Public Library speaks of their long-standing and increasingly supportive commitment to public library services and to literacy. The Board approved a renewal of the sponsorship agreement with TD for 2006 to 2008, including the continuation of their nine-year title sponsorship of the TD Summer Reading Club, now available to libraries across Canada.
