WHEN JUNE CALLWOOD saw there was a problem, she tried to find a way to do something about it. This author, journalist and social activist has written books and articles that prick our consciences. She has founded more than 50 social action organizations — safe havens for anyone who needs help — for teen moms, for homeless women and a beautiful, welcoming hospice for people dying of AIDS.

On April 26, Toronto Public Library will be inaugurating

a new annual social issues lecture to be named in honour of June Callwood. The mandate of the lecture is to explore contemporary issues with an emphasis on social justice and activism. Guest speakers will be front line workers who will share with us their experiences, perspectives and passion.

The first lecture will feature Mary Jo Leddy, who has been active in human rights and peace groups since the 1970s. An award-winning author, Leddy writes about human goodness and encourages people to spend time with other people.

The Toronto Public Library Foundation has established the June Callwood Endowment Fund to support the annual lecture.

Black and Caribbean heritage book club launched

A new book club, focusing on black and Caribbean heritage, is part of extensive readers' advisory-related services at Toronto Public Library. The book club, launched recently at Malvern Branch, is just one of 78 library book discussion groups, including another Black and Caribbean heritage club that started at Cedarbrae last fall. Another resource, a list of recommended reading and viewing called Front Row Toronto, has just been added to our website and includes lists of music, films and books related to theatrical productions in and around Toronto, including the National Ballet, the Canadian

Opera, the Shaw and Stratford festivals and the Toronto Symphony. Other recent additions to Recommended Reading highlight our French-language materials.

Woodside Square Branch doubles in size

The newly relocated Woodside Square Branch (Woodside Square Mall, 1571 Sandhurst Circle) will open to the public on April 30. At 10,000 square feet, the branch is more than double the size of the previous location. It is one of Toronto's busiest libraries with customers borrowing almost a half-a-million books, CDs, DVDs and magazines annually. Enjoy entertainment, food and fun at the grand opening, Monday, April 30 at noon.

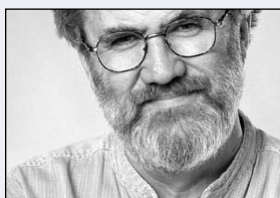
Board welcomes new members
