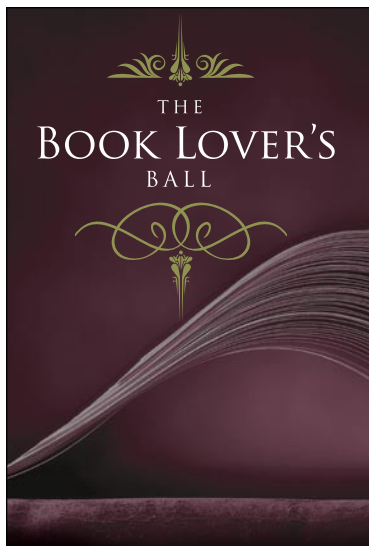

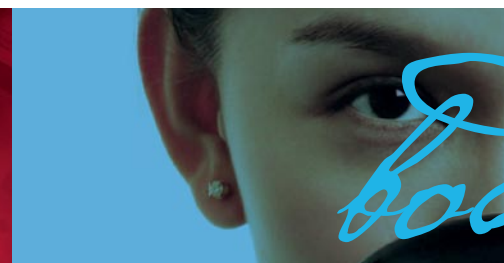

### Keep Toronto Reading 2007

Something for every part of your mind, body and soul

FEBRUARY WAS A month of expecting the unexpected as the Library hosted its second annual Keep Toronto Reading celebration. Events were diverse and original with star-studded line-ups and celebrity hostings.

Toronto Public Library and CBC Radio 99.1 joined forces for Toronto Celebrates Canada Reads 2007, a highlight

of this year's Canada Reads program. Close to 350 guests enjoyed readings from actress Megan Follows, renowned chef Jamie Kennedy, writers David Bezmozgis and Anosh Irani and playwright Hannah Moscovitch. Matt Galloway served as host and Suba Sankaran provided musical entertainment.

Nine Flavours of Literature, not only returned this year, but expanded from two to three locations a week. TPL once again partnered with International Readings at Harbourfront Centre and Starbucks, bringing back the ever-popular Starbucks bag lunches for just \$5. It was a literary treat for all. From 'Sweet & Spicy' to 'Other Worldly Delights,' there was something for everyone on how to write Harlequin novels, mysteries, science fiction and more.

To complement the Lit Lunches, TPL and LCBO united to create Vino Vin Vino,

a series with an extraordinary combination of Italian, French, and South American author readings and wine-tastings in the Library. LCBO's *Food & Wine* columnist Lucy Waverman was on hand at the Yorkville Branch to launch the first of three sold out venues.

Bryan Lee O'Malley, creator of the Scott Pilgrim series — *Entertainment Weekly's* Independent Comic of the Year (2006) — visited North York Central Library and shared some teasers about the highly anticipated new Scott Pilgrim comic coming out this year.

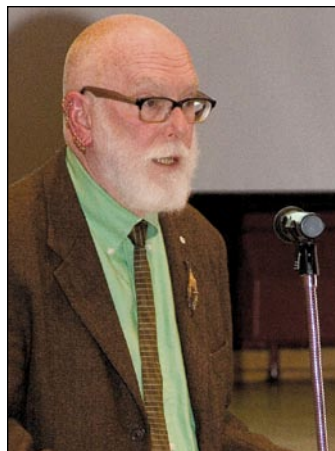

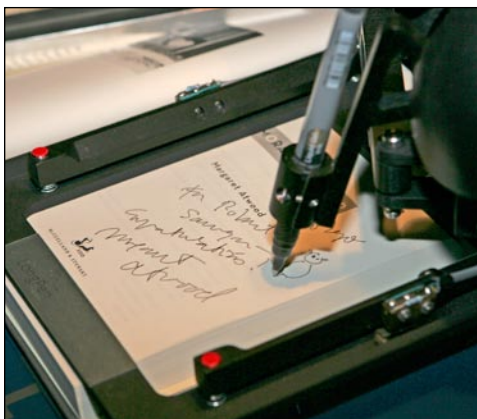

## Library Board Highlights February 26, 2007

### Jane/Sheppard Capital Project

The Board approved a funding increase for the Jane/Sheppard capital project to avoid a one-year closure of the existing branch while the new branch is under construction. The funding increase, amounting to \$487,000 debt (\$527,000 gross), will be fully funded by savings realized from the S. Walter Stewart branch project. The transfer will not affect S. Walter Stewart and has a zero net impact on debt funding from the City.

### Ontario Municipal Benchmarking Initiative

The Board received for information the report *Ontario Municipal Benchmarking Initiative — 2005 Performance Benchmarking Report*. The purpose of the initiative is to identify and develop appropriate service-specific performance measures and benchmark the results to identify best practices. Out of nine library systems, Toronto Public Library ranks first in number of library holdings per capita; first in number of times in a year circulating items are borrowed; first in number of library uses per capita; second lowest in cost per library use; and lowest in annual number of library service hours per capita (3-way draw).
