

Toronto Public Library [announced](#) the Sell Books to the Library pilot program on December 10, 2014. Noah Richler's opinion piece, published on December 20 (link below), generated social media commentary, predominantly criticizing the program.

Media coverage continued in January and was largely positive. In February, one local newspaper covered the [letter written by a group of Canadian authors](#) calling for an end to the program and included perspectives both in favour of and against the program. Overall, there was more positive traditional media coverage than negative on the program, but more negative social media commentary, particularly surrounding Noah Richler's opinion piece.
