

Branch Capital Campaign Opportunities

SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to seek Toronto Public Library Board approval to provide the Toronto Public Library Foundation's (TPLF) Board with a list of proposed branches suited to multi-year, capital fundraising campaign opportunities.

Most of the proposed projects are at early stages of ideation, which allows time for multi-year capital campaigns and stakeholder engagement to be developed and executed.

Funds raised through a capital campaign would enhance the Toronto Public Library's (TPL) operating and capital budgets, providing opportunities to renovate, expand, and enhance facilities and operations within a shortened timeframe.

TPL and TPLF will work together to understand, narrow down, and ultimately select project(s) most appropriate for multi-year, capital fundraising campaigns.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The City Librarian recommends that the Toronto Public Library Board:

1. approve nine projects to be considered by the TPLF Board for multi-year, capital fundraising campaign opportunities: Toronto Reference Library, Lillian H. Smith, St. Lawrence, Sanderson, Parliament Street/Regent Park, City Hall, Northern District, Barbara Frum, North York Central Library (6th floor).

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Funds raised by TPLF through a capital campaign would enhance the Library's operating and capital budgets funded by the City, and would provide opportunities to renovate, expand and enhance facilities and operations within a shortened timeframe.

The Director, Finance & Treasurer has reviewed this financial impact statement and agrees with it.

ALIGNMENT WITH STRATEGIC PLAN

The first strategic priority in Toronto Public Library's strategic plan 2020-2024 is to open up our public spaces. To achieve this objective, TPL will create and animate accessible, inclusive spaces that are flexible and sustainable to inspire Torontonians to be and grow together. TPL's Facilities Capital Projects are critical to the library achieving this strategic objective.

EQUITY IMPACT STATEMENT

TPL's Facilities Capital Projects focus on equity by seeking to understand and break down barriers to access and increase inclusion. The design and animation of our spaces allows for everyone to feel welcome and have equitable access and opportunity to use and benefit from library space. The planning, design and location of library spaces must represent the expressed needs of the communities they serve and support users of all abilities to feel comfortable, welcome and represented. Specifically, adherence to AODA standards, and TPL's Indigenous Strategies to increase Indigenization of TPL buildings and spaces are key equity initiatives of TPL's Facilities Capital Projects.

DECISION HISTORY

At its meeting on February 28, 2022, the Board received the [2022 Fundraising Initiatives](#) report updating the Board of major gift fundraising initiatives for 2022-2024. One the initiatives identified was Capital Projects including Toronto Reference Library.

ISSUE BACKGROUND

The TPLF Board has identified a multi-year capital fundraising campaign as one of its priorities and has requested TPL to identify suitable projects that would be most appropriate for such a campaign. As a result, TPL staff have identified nine potential projects. TPL and TPLF, along with their Boards will work together to review, narrow down and ultimately select the project(s) for which a multi-year capital campaign would be launched.

The projects being proposed provide a variety of options and opportunities covering different communities across the city, varying budgets and project types, including renovations, expansions and brand new builds. The presentation accompanying this report provides details for each project including selection criteria and brief background as to why the project may be suitable for a capital campaign.

TPLF has led a successful multi-year capital campaign in the past. In 2007, TPLF launched “re:vitalise – Toronto Reference Library Campaign” which was a broad-based \$10 million capital fundraising campaign in support of the Toronto Reference Library revitalization project. The campaign successfully completed in 2011.

COMMENTS

The majority of the projects that have been chosen are at early stages of ideation, which allows time for multi-year capital campaigns and stakeholder engagement to be developed. Each project also presents a unique opportunity providing a variety of options that can be pursued and promoted as a part of the capital campaign. The projects chosen represent a variety of costs ranging from \$17M to \$50M.

Projects that are already in progress: have already been initiated or are in late stages of planning are not being put forward for consideration. TPL and TPLF will work together to review, further refine, and ultimately select project(s) most appropriate for multi-year, capital fundraising campaigns.

The following projects are being proposed:

- Toronto Reference Library
- Lillian H. Smith
- St. Lawrence
- Sanderson
- Parliament Street/Regent Park
- City Hall
- Northern District
- Barbara Frum, and
- North York Central Library (6th Floor).

These projects represent important and iconic institutions in Toronto and for TPL. They are, or will be architecturally significant buildings, representing design excellence while meeting the functional and operational needs of the library. They are located in high-needs and/or growing communities. The branches will bring new and expanded services and each provides its own unique contribution to the community it serves.

CONCLUSION

The nine proposed branches will be presented to the TPLF Board at its June 2022 Board meeting for consideration as a part of its capital fundraising campaign.

TPL will work with TPLF and its Board to assist with the selection of the most appropriate project(s) and will report back on the decision to the TPL Board at a future fundraising initiative update.






