2023 Operating Budget - Adoption

SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to seek Toronto Public Library Board adoption of the 2023 operating budget of \$213.559 million net (\$234.610 million gross), including 1,838.3 full-time equivalent positions (FTEs), as approved by City Council on February 15, 2023, which includes:

- a base budget increase of \$5.000 million net (\$6.012 million gross), or 2.4%, over the 2022 budget;
- budget enhancements totalling \$0.000 million net (\$0.889 million gross, fully funded by the Toronto Public Library Foundation); and
- funding for COVID-19 pressures totalling \$3.553 million net (\$2.629 million gross).

The 2023 budget year is particularly challenging for both Toronto Public Library (TPL) and the City with the continuing impacts of COVID-19, high inflation, supply chain disruptions and staffing challenges. There have also been steady increases in the usage of TPL services across all service areas and increased incidents of violence and

disruptive behaviour in library branches that reflect trends occurring more broadly in the city.

Despite these issues and challenges, the City continues to recognize TPL’s role in supporting Council priorities, including the City’s rebuild and recovery strategy, and the approved 2023 budget will allow TPL to maintain services and service levels while also advancing TPL’s and the City’s strategic objectives.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The City Librarian recommends that the Toronto Public Library Board:

- adopts the Council-approved 2023 operating budget of \$213.559 million net (\$234.610 million gross), which includes 1,838.3 full-time equivalent staff positions.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The Council-approved 2023 operating budget is \$213.559 million net (\$234.610 million gross), which includes: a base budget increase of \$5.000 million net (\$6.012 million gross), or 2.4%; budget enhancement funding of \$0.000 million net (\$0.889 million gross, fully funded by the TPL Foundation); and COVID-19 related funding of \$3.553 million net (\$2.629 million gross), as detailed in Attachment 1 and summarized below in Table 1, which highlights the development of the 2023 budget from the 2022 budget.

ALIGNMENT WITH STRATEGIC PLAN

TPL's 2023 operating budget advances TPL's strategic plan by:

- supporting an inclusive economic recovery as part of the City's recovery and rebuild strategy;
- advancing equity in the city and workplace, contributing to the shared outcomes of the City's equity strategies;
- ensuring the safety and security of TPL staff and customers in our welcoming and accessible public spaces; and
- providing affordable, accessible and resilient digital supports as a public service for all.

The budget request also advances TPL's Digital Strategy as the Library continues to modernize its digital capabilities and business operations,

EQUITY IMPACT STATEMENT

TPL's 2023 budget supports an inclusive economic recovery as part of the City's recovery initiatives, provides affordable, accessible, and resilient digital supports as a public service, and advances equity in the city and workplace. The budget will have a positive impact on many equity-deserving groups, including newcomers and low-income families and individuals. Access to library resources and programs can increase access to learning opportunities, City, Provincial, and Federal information, training and employment opportunities, and opportunities for civic engagement and community participation.

The investment in TPL's budget helps advance key City strategies, including the Toronto Newcomer Strategy, Toronto Poverty Reduction Strategy, Toronto Seniors Strategy 2.0, Toronto Strong Neighbourhood Strategy 2020, Toronto Youth Equity Strategy, SafeTO, the Reconciliation Action Plan, Toronto Action Plan to Confront Anti-Black Racism, and TPL's Strategic Plan (2020-2024): *Vital to Toronto – Building Success, Resilience and Well-Being for our City*.

DECISION HISTORY

At its meeting on February 28, 2022, the Library Board reviewed [2022 Operating Budget – Adoption](#), and adopted a recommendation for the reinstatement of annual cost of living adjustment (COLA) increases for non-union staff at a rate consistent with

the COLA increases for union staff, which was approved by Council for the City's non-union staff.

At its meeting on May 24, 2022, the Board considered [Non-Union Compensation](#), which explained that TPL has a long history of following the City's non-union compensation program and this has been mandated by the Library Board. The report noted that after being paused in 2020 and 2021, City Council directed the City Manager to update the City's non-union compensation program, informed by an independent study of the City's competitive position. TPL continues to follow the City's updated non-union compensation plan.

At its meeting on October 25, 2022, the Library Board approved a [2023 Operating Budget Submission](#) which resulted in a 2023 operating budget comprised of the following:

- 1.1 base budget with an increase over 2022 of \$9.704 million net (\$10.267 million gross), or 4.7%, which included the reversal of \$2.267 million of savings from staff vacancy experience;
- 1.2 budget enhancements totalling \$8.321 million net (\$9.210 million gross) comprised of:
 - a. budget enhancements totalling \$0.000 million net (\$0.889 million gross fully funded by TPL Foundation) for Community-based Service for Equity Deserving Populations (\$0.000 million net and \$0.141 million gross), Financial Empowerment Service (\$0.000 million net and \$0.248 million gross) and Social Service Team (\$0.000 million net and \$0.500 million gross). The Community-based Service for Equity Deserving populations, Financial Empowerment Service and Social Service Team budget enhancements are fully funded by the TPL Foundation; and
 - b. Open Hours budget enhancements totalling \$8.321 million net and gross, or 4.1%, and
- 1.3 COVID-19 pressures of \$5.053 million net (\$3.879 million gross).

At its meeting on December 5, 2022, the Board considered [Revised 2023 Budget Enhancement – Open Hours](#) and adopted a motion which revised and deferred the request for enhanced open hours to the 2024 budget, which resulted in a 2023 operating budget comprised of the following:

- 1.1 base budget with an increase over 2022 of \$9.704 million net (\$10.267 million gross), or 4.7%;

- 1.2 budget enhancements totalling \$0.000 million net (\$0.889 million gross fully funded by the TPL Foundation); and
- 1.3 COVID-19 pressures of \$5.053 million net (\$3.879 million gross)

At its meeting on January 5, 2023, the Board approved a [2023 Operating Budget Submission – Revised](#) which resulted in a revised 2023 operating budget comprised of the following:

- 1.1 base budget with an increase over 2022 of \$5.000 million net (\$6.012 million gross), or 2.4%;
- 1.2 budget enhancements totalling \$0.000 million net (\$0.889 million gross fully funded by the TPL Foundation); and
- 1.3 COVID-19 related budget pressures of \$3.553 million net (\$2.629 million gross).

In order to meet the City's funding allocation, the revised budget request included further budget savings through updated costing, spending deferrals, and an additional \$1.500 million in savings through staff vacancy experience and an unallocated budget reduction of \$0.906 million.

At the meeting on January 10, 2023, the City's Budget Committee began consideration of the [2023 Operating Budget and 2023-2032 Capital Budget and Plan](#) as presented by the City Manager, which included TPL's [2023 Budget Notes](#). The 2023 operating budget for TPL was \$213.559 million net (\$234.610 million gross), which was the same as the submission approved by the Board at its January 5 2023 Board meeting.

At its meeting on January 23, 2023, the Board endorsed the [2023 Operating Budget Enhancements](#), which were included in the City's 2023 budget tabled at the January 10, 2023 meeting of the Budget Committee. The 2023 budget enhancements are changed based on the City's proposed funding allocation for 2024-2025.

The Community-based Service for Equity Deserving Populations budget enhancement is funded by the TPL Foundation and this service will proceed as a pilot. There is currently no commitment by the City to fund this service after the pilot.

The TPL Foundation has committed to fund the Financial Empowerment Service and Social Service Team budget enhancements for both 2023 and 2024, and the City will commit to funding these services starting in 2025.

ISSUE BACKGROUND

As a result of the 2022 Toronto municipal elections, there was no Informal Budget Committee review for the 2023 Budget, which is normally held in October.

On November 23, 2022, the Provincial Government of Ontario passed [Bill 3, Strong Mayors, Building Homes Act, 2022](#) which changed the budget process and makes the Mayor responsible for proposing the municipal budget for Council consideration, subject to Council amendments. As part of the budget process, City Council would be able to make changes to the Mayor's proposed budget, which the Mayor could then veto. Council could override a Mayoral veto with two-thirds majority vote.

COMMENTS

At its final meeting on January 24, 2023 Budget Committee endorsed TPL's 2023 operating budget as presented on January 10, with no changes.

On February 1, 2023, the Mayor's Proposed 2023 budget for the City included an unchanged TPL operating budget of \$213.559 million net (\$234.610 million gross).

At City Council meeting on February 15, 2023, TPL's [2023 Operating and Capital Budgets](#) of \$213.559 million net (\$234.610 million gross), which includes 1,838.3 FTEs, was approved.

Approved 2023 Operating Budget

TPL's total Council-approved 2023 operating budget is \$213.559 million net (\$234.610 million gross), which includes:

- a base budget increase of \$5.000 million net (\$6.012 million gross), or 2.4%;
- budget enhancement funding of \$0.000 million net (\$0.889 million gross), which is funded by TPL Foundation; and
- COVID-19 related funding of \$3.553 million net (\$2.629 million gross).

The 2023 budget year is particularly challenging for both TPL and the City with the continuing impacts of COVID-19, high inflation, supply chain disruptions, and staffing challenges. There have also been steady increases in the usage of TPL services across all service areas; and increased incidents of violence and disruptive behaviour in library branches that reflect trends occurring more broadly in the city.

Despite these issues and challenges, the City continues to recognize TPL’s role in supporting Council priorities, including the City’s rebuild and recovery strategy, and the approved 2023 budget will allow TPL to maintain services and service levels while also advancing TPL’s and the City’s strategic objectives.

The approved budget has a number of savings/affordability measures which were necessary to meet the City’s funding allocation and to avoid service reductions. Budget spending in 2023 will need to be carefully monitored and many of these reductions will add pressure to the 2024 budget, which currently has a base budget outlook increase of \$14.157 million net, or 6.6%

A preliminary allocation of the 2023 operating budget by expenditure/revenue category types is summarized in Table 2 below.

Staffing Costs

TPL's base budgeted staffing costs will be increased by approximately \$5.602 million and is primarily impacted by:

- salary and benefit cost of living adjustments for union and non-union staff totalling \$4.523 million net, including costs related to changes to the eligibility rules for the Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System (OMERS) that allow all part-time employees to opt into the program;
- net increase of \$0.103 million, including 2.0 FTEs related to the second year impact of the 2022 Council-approved service enhancements for the Digital Literacy for Seniors initiative;
- operating impact of capital resulting in a net increase of \$0.136 million, including 12.0 FTEs as detailed in TPL's 2023-2032 capital budget;
- net increase of \$0.259 million, including 8.0 FTEs, to help support TPL's alternative approach to security as a response to increased incidents of violent and disruptive behaviour in TPL branches, mirroring what is happening more broadly in the city;
- net increase of \$0.061 million, including 3.0 FTEs, related to the third year of the Digital Services Modernization; and
- additional staff savings of \$1.500 million net related to vacancies due to the ongoing impacts of COVID-19 on TPL operations that has resulted in increased vacancies and staff churn, which is over and above the usual vacancy experience that is already in the base. Although TPL's rate of vacancy experience is projected to remain high into 2023, these additional staff savings will be closely monitored.

Materials and Supplies

Net increase of \$0.306 million based on the economic factors provided by the City.

Equipment, Services and Rents

With the inflation rate at its highest level in over 30 years, there is net increase of \$1.775 million related to economic increases for facilities and IT-related contracts.

Contributions and Transfers to Reserves

The approved budget also includes savings of \$0.764 million net resulting from forgoing reserve contributions and is comprised of:

- \$0.364 million net to the Fleet Reserve; and
- \$0.400 million net to the Asset Replacement Reserve.

Unallocated reduction

The approved budget also includes \$0.906 million net, which is currently unallocated.

Fines, Fees and Room Rentals

Net increase of \$0.521 million primarily related to increased room rental revenues from the opening of new NYCL premium room rentals.

Contributions & Transfers from Reserves

Net increase of \$0.341 million primarily related to increase of recovery of project management costs related to TPL's 2023-2032 Capital Budget and Plan.

Other Revenues

Net increase of \$0.150 million primarily related to a one-time recovery of shared common area maintenance costs at NYCL.

2023 Budget Enhancements

TPL's 2023 budget enhancements total \$0.000 million net (\$0.889 million gross), or 0.0%, including 4.5 FTEs, and advance a number of TPL strategic objectives while supporting many of the City of Toronto's key strategies, including the Poverty Reduction Strategy.

Community-Based Service for Equity Deserving Populations

TPL's Community-Based Service for Equity-Deserving Populations builds on and extends branch-based and online library services by targeting TPL's reach to serving individuals and families from vulnerable and equity-deserving groups while they are accessing services as clients at community social service and support agencies. The service enhancement establishes a team of community librarians dedicated to serving equity deserving populations across the city.

The Community-based Service for Equity Deserving Populations budget enhancement is funded by the TPL Foundation in 2023 and this service will proceed as a pilot. There is currently no commitment by the City to fund this service after the pilot.

Financial Empowerment Service

The Financial Empowerment Service (FES) is a City of Toronto Poverty Reduction Strategy initiative, developed in partnership with Prosper Canada, a national charity. FES provides services to vulnerable populations targeting persons with low income often intersecting with the following other equity-deserving groups: persons with disabilities; individuals and families who are homeless or under-housed; Black and racialized individuals; Indigenous Peoples; immigrants, refugees, and undocumented individuals; and vulnerable youths and seniors.

The FES enhancement will provide one-on-one, in-person support from community agency experts providing in-depth and personalized counselling to Torontonians within library branches on topics such as: filing taxes, savings & debt levels, credit and budgeting. Customers will also have access to curated online resources and opportunities to engage with library staff and partner agencies for additional supports.

The TPL Foundation has committed to fund the Financial Empowerment Service enhancement for both 2023 and 2024, and the City has committed to funding these services starting in 2025.

Social Service Team

TPL's new Social Service Team (SST) model provides service to vulnerable populations including individuals from the following and often intersecting equity-deserving groups: persons with low income, persons with disabilities, individuals and families who are homeless or under-housed, racialized groups including Black and Indigenous Peoples, immigrants, refugees, and undocumented individuals, and vulnerable youth and seniors.

The SST enhancement will support onsite services at designated library branches allowing TPL customers to access community-agency-provided services that integrate social and mental health services in one space. TPL designed the program with community partners specifically for TPL customers who are the most vulnerable and least likely able to navigate access to the mental and physical health resources and social service supports required to improve their lives and their well-being.

The TPL Foundation has committed to fund the Social Service Team enhancement for both 2023 and 2024, and the City has committed to funding these services starting in 2025

2023 COVID-19 budget pressures

COVID-19 had a significant impact on operations in 2022, and the expectation is that many budget pressures will continue into 2023 as TPL continues to ensure all safety precautions are available for staff and customers.

The 2022 and 2023 COVID-19 budget pressures is detailed in Table 3 below.

The 2023 COVID-19 budget-related pressures total \$3.553 million net (\$2.629 million gross) and is comprised of:

- increased security guard service costs totalling \$1.500 million to support safety and compliance with the Code of Conduct in the branches;
- increased health and safety, including PPEs, rapid antigen testing kits and air filters, totalling \$1.160 million;
- Reduced expenditures totalling \$0.031 million in venues and room bookings related to decreased revenues; and
- revenue losses totalling \$0.925 million primarily related to decreased venue and room bookings.


